



Pennsylvania's Juvenile Act Purpose Clause Revised in 2012

▶ §6301 (b) Purposes (3)(i)employing evidencebased practices whenever possible and, in the case of a delinquent child, by using the least restrictive intervention that is consistent with the protection of the community, the imposition of accountability for offenses committed and the rehabilitation, supervision and treatment needs of the child;...

Diversion Mission Statement:

"Consistent with our balanced and restorative justice mission, and recognizing diversion as part of the JJSES, the Delinquency Diversion Committee will work to identify best-practice, pre-adjudication alternatives to assist probation departments and stakeholders to redirect youth from further involvement in the juvenile justice system and avoid long term collateral consequences of formal adjudication.





Diversion Definition

► "Juvenile diversion is an intervention strategy, which may occur at various formal and informal contact points, that redirects youth away from traditional processing and deeper juvenile justice involvement while still holding them accountable for their actions.

Goal: Employ evidence-based practices at every phase of the juvenile justice process

- Objective: Increase awareness and use of evidence-based practices in diversion
 - Activity 1: Provide educational resources on diversion to stakeholders.
 - Activity 2: Ensure fundamental fairness in decision-making
 - ► Activity 3: Research & disseminate information on funding implementation of diversion

<u>Goal: Collect data necessary to measure results of juvenile justice initiatives/activities</u>

- Objective: Analyze data to determine the use and effectiveness of diversion
 - Activity 1: Develop methods to collect data on diversion
 - Activity 2: Identify existing program availability and gaps via JJSES Implementation Survey to ensure an adequate range of services for youth

Goal: Advance professional development

- Objective: Increase training opportunities on diversion for juvenile justice stakeholders
 - Activity 1: Identify resources and offer training to stakeholders on diversion



Governor-Appointed Juvenile Justice Task Force (Dec. 2019)


- Task Force Report released 2021
- Key Findings:
 - Most young people enter the juvenile justice system for low-level behavior
 - Despite its success, diversion is underutilized
 - Young people with low level cases end up on probation and in residential placement
 - Youth spend years out of home and under court supervision, on average
 - Only 20% of spending on delinquency services is allocated to services for youth living at home
 - ► The likelihood that similarly situated youth of different racial or ethnic backgrounds, or youth in different counties, receive the same response from the system varies widely—even for nearly identical behavior
 - Some of the largest racial disparities exist for Black Non-Hispanic youth—especially boys—who receive the most punitive responses



Juvenile Justice Task Force Recommendations (Diversion-Related)


Reinvest in	Recommendation #1: Reinvest in non-residential evidence-based practices (includes investment in diversion services)
Raise	Recommendation #8: Raise minimum age of juvenile court jurisdiction
Expand	Recommendation #10: Expand services as alternatives to arrest and court referral
Expand and standardize	Recommendation #11: Expand and standardize school-based diversion
Prohibit	Recommendation #12: Prohibit written allegations in juvenile court for failure to comply in MDJ
Expand and standardize	Recommendation #13: Expand and standardize informal adjustment and other prepetition diversion and tailor criteria for post-petition diversion.


