This report provides an overview of juvenile court dispositions in Pennsylvania during 2013 and preceding years, and summarizes juvenile court statistical data provided by county juvenile probation departments. Without the support of the courts and juvenile probation departments, this report would not be possible.

Although the report focuses primarily on delinquency dispositions, information has again been included on dependency cases that have been referred to juvenile probation departments. While county children and youth agencies handle the overwhelming majority of cases involving dependent children in the Commonwealth, some juvenile probation departments provide services to children who are alleged to be dependent on the basis of ungovernability or chronic truancy.

The information contained in this report is of value to all individuals, agencies and organizations having an interest in the Pennsylvania juvenile justice system. However, it is not intended to reflect the total workload of juvenile courts or juvenile probation departments.

It is with great pleasure that we dedicate this report to the judges, probation officers, victim advocates, district attorneys, service treatment providers, and other professionals who work on a daily basis in the Pennsylvania juvenile court system.

The JDDAT application was developed to facilitate independent analysis of annual dispositions reported to the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission (JCJC) by juvenile probation departments throughout the Commonwealth and can be accessed at <u>www.jcjc.state.pa.us.</u>

Please note, the data contained in JDDAT is updated on a regular basis by all sixty-seven juvenile probation departments and therefore may not match the information contained in this report.

The JDDAT was developed for the JCJC by the National Center for Juvenile Justice, with funding from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP), Office of Justice Programs, U.S. Department of Justice and it is maintained by the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission's Center for Juvenile Justice Training and Research.

This report is a compilation of the data collected from the juvenile probation departments throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

As in the past, to avoid confusion regarding the unit of count used in tabulating juvenile court statistics and to improve the understanding of how data can be interpreted, please note:

- 1. The primary unit of count is the *disposition*. A *disposition* is defined as an allegation disposed of by the juvenile probation department and/or the court. Within a single delinquency allegation, a youth may be charged with a number of offenses that may result in multiple petitions. Any one youth may be involved in a number of dispositions within a calendar year. In addition, a youth may be referred on more than one occasion and receive only one disposition. Dependency dispositions include only those referrals to probation departments alleging dependency that are not accompanied by allegations of delinquency. Therefore, one is cautioned NOT to attempt to interpret dispositions as the number of youth who are processed by the court or the number of offenses charged to juveniles;
- 2. There are times when you will see the word *case* used to describe the data. In this report, the word *case* is used interchangeably with the word *disposition*;
- 3. The *unit of count* refers to a case disposed of by a juvenile court and/or juvenile probation department. The term *disposed* means that a definite action/decision has been implemented or that a treatment plan has been decided upon or begun;
- 4. The statistical system is constructed to collect up to the seven (7) most serious offenses per delinquency disposition;
- 5. The Commission collects additional information on *placement reviews, disposition reviews*, and selected special conditions attached to a disposition. A *disposition review* is a hearing conducted before the court regarding a previous disposition which did not result in out-of-home placement. A *placement review* is a hearing conducted before the court regarding a previous disposition which did not result in out-of-home placement;
- 6. The data in the secure detention section of this report were collected in conjunction with the JCJC Secure Detention Monitoring Program. This information should not be compared with detention data collected and reported prior to 1989; and
- 7. The reader is cautioned that in the tables containing rows with "percent of total", the row may not total 100 percent due to rounding.

The format and presentation of the data in this report are intended to help summarize various trends in juvenile court processing throughout the Commonwealth. In addition to the graphs and charts, narrative is included that is intended to help readers more quickly recognize various statewide trends, as well as highlight information not reflected in the visual displays.

Please note that some 2012 data has been updated since the initial release of the 2012 Pennsylvania Juvenile Court Dispositions. Those updates are reflected in the relevant charts and graphs, as well in the narrative on year-to-year comparisons.

The data within this year's report is generally organized in a manner that reflects the chronological processing of juvenile court delinquency cases. With the exception of pages 3-5 (*Delinquency Dispositions through Frequencies of Statewide Delinquency Dispositions*), the data presented flows logically from allegation source through placement.


Within this report, some of the data is organized and presented in graphs by Class County. This will help readers make comparisons across counties of similar size and demographic composition.

While some county-specific data is presented within the body of the report, all of the raw data for each of Pennsylvania's 67 counties remains available for viewing. For each section within the report, please reference the appendices to review county-specific data on that topical area.

We draw your attention to the following statistical highlights of 2013:

- There were 28,957 delinquency-related dispositions in Pennsylvania during 2013. This represents a 6.8% decrease from 2012, and a 30.3% decrease since 2009 (page 4).
- Statewide secure detention admissions have declined 16.6% since 2012 (page 14), and 32.8% since 2009.
- Statewide, delinquency placements have declined each year since 2009, and have decreased by 27.6% since 2009 (page 19).
- Seventeen year olds accounted for the most dispositions of any age group in 2013, representing 26.1% of all dispositions, followed in descending order by sixteen year olds (21.2%) and fifteen year olds (16.8%) (page 26).
- Youth whose biological parents were reported as "never married" represented more than 48% of all delinquency dispositions, while youth whose parents were reported as "married" represented 16.8% (page 28).
- Statewide, 47.5% of youth were reported as residing only with their mother, while 17.5% of youth resided with both biological parents (page 28).
- The majority of all delinquency dispositions involved White Non-Hispanic youth (43.8%), followed in descending order by Black Non-Hispanic youth (38.4%) and Hispanic youth (12.8%) (page 30).





Delinquency Dispositions

Delinquency Dispositions, 2009-2013

There were 28,957 delinquency-related dispositions in Pennsylvania during 2013. This represents a 6.8% decrease from 2012 and a 30.3% decrease since 2009. A majority (54.7%) of the total dispositions occurred in the eight jurisdictions reporting more than 1,000 dispositions (see map on page 3).

Dispositions resulting from Disposition and Placement Reviews, and Dependency referrals are not included.







From 2012-2013, in the Commonwealth's largest jurisdictions, Allegheny County reported an increase in delinquency dispositions of 5.2%, while Philadelphia reported a decrease in delinquency dispositions of 7.0%.

Source of Allegation




The Police and Magisterial District Judges continue to be the primary sources of delinquency allegations – 73.8% and 18.9% respectively.



Attorney Representation in Formal Delinquency Proceedings, 2013


Legal representation provided by Public Defenders continued to be the most common form of representation in delinquency proceedings (72.7% in 2013). Legal representation was provided by Court Appointed or Private Counsel in 27.2% of delinquency proceedings. (An entry of "Court Appointed" includes cases where counsel. other than the public defender, *was appointed by the court.*) **Delinquency proceedings** were conducted without defense counsel (waived or not present) in less than 1% of all delinquency proceedings.

A breakdown of dispositions where attorney representation



was waived and where no attorney was present is shown in the accompanying charts. Of the 6 cases in 2013 in which an attorney was waived, five of those cases resulted in a disposition of Fines/Costs Ordered and one was dismissed. Of the 6 cases in which an attorney was not present, 3 cases resulted in an "Other" disposition, two resulted in a disposition of Dismissed, and fines and costs were ordered in one case.


The data on attorney representation include only the dispositions that occurred at a formal proceeding, defined as a hearing held before a judge or master, after the filing of a petition. Informally handled cases, reviews, and dependency cases are not included.






Counties with Dispositions Involving Formal Proceedings with Waived Attorney or No Attorney, 2013

Shown below are the counties that reported any dispositions with a waived attorney or no attorney present. The percentage of proceedings with waived representation is less than 1% of all formal proceedings in the county. The percentage of proceedings with no attorney present is less than 1% of all formal proceedings in each of the counties listed.







Median Time Lapse for Formal vs. Informal Proceedings by Type of Disposition, 2013

Statewide, cases handled through informal proceedings were disposed of sooner than cases handled through formal proceedings (52 days vs. 91 days). Significant distinctions in time lapse occurred with cases resulting in dispositions of Fines/Costs Ordered (more than three times as long for formal proceedings) and Continued on Previous Disposition (more than three times as long for formal proceedings).

A formal proceeding is defined as a hearing held before a judge or master, after the filing of a petition. The time lapse is measured from the Date of Allegation to the Date of Disposition.

NOTE: Does not include disposition and placement reviews.

(Note: In the 61 cases resulting in a disposition of Informal Adjustment, the petition was withdrawn at the hearing.)

Informal

In the cases resulting in a disposition of Placement (3), the disposition was reported to have been ordered by the court without a post-petition hearing being held. In 1 of the 3 cases resulting in a disposition of Transferred to Criminal *Proceedings, the juvenile was* reported to have requested transfer to criminal court, the District Attorney filed a *motion, and the Court granted* the motion via court order. In the other two cases, it was later *determined that the juvenile* court did not have jurisdiction.




Median Time Lapse for Formal vs. Informal Proceedings, 2009-2013

Formal Proceedings Time Lapse Median in Days

The time lapse for formal proceedings has decreased by 1.1% since 2012 (from 92 to 91 days).

The time lapse for informal proceedings increased by 4% since 2012 (from 50 to 52 days).




Delinquency Offenses



Alleged Offenses, 2009-2013

Alleged Offenses have decreased by 10.3% from 2012 to 2013 and have decreased by 38.4% since 2009. The "Other" offense category has shown the largest decrease (13.6%) from 2012 and "Property" offenses decreased by 10.7%. (*The "Other" offenses category includes, but is not limited to: Public Order offenses such as Disorderly Conduct or Weapon on School Property; Firearms Offenses; and Certifications from the minor judiciary that a juvenile failed to comply with a lawful sentence imposed for a summary offense).*

Overall, Property offenses have shown the sharpest decline (42.3%) since 2009. Person and Drug offenses have also declined significantly, 39.5% and 38.6% respectively, with "Other" offenses decreasing 32.7% over the same period.





Substantiated Offenses, 2009-2013

Substantiated offenses decreased significantly from 2012 (29.3%). The largest decrease occurred in the Property offense category (35.3%). Person offenses decreased by 28.8%, Drug offenses decreased by 24.5%, and "Other" offenses decreased by 23.9%. (The "Other" offenses category includes, but is not limited to: Public Order offenses such as Disorderly Conduct or Weapon on School Property; Firearms Offenses; and Certifications from the minor judiciary that a juvenile failed to comply with a lawful sentence imposed for a summary offense).

The total number of substantiated offenses remains well below 2009 levels. Similarly, each category of substantiated offenses (Person, Property, Drugs and "Other") remains below their respective 2009 levels.




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
Most Serious Offenses, 2009-2013

The chart at the right shows the statewide total of the most serious alleged charges from 2009-2013. Only the most serious charge per disposition is depicted. The Crime Severity key to the right shows the crime severity ranking employed for coding purposes. A disposition with an alleged robbery charge and an alleged drug charge was counted in the robbery category.

There were decreases in each of the most serious alleged charge categories from 2012 to 2013 except for Rape offenses. Alleged aggravated assault charges decreased by 11.7%, Robbery charges decreased by 3.8% and Drug charges decreased by 3.2%. Alleged Rape charges increased by 5.3%.



The chart at the left shows the most serious substantiated charges. The same Crime Severity Ranking methodology was utilized here.

Each category of substantiated offenses decreased from 2012 with the exception of Rape. Substantiated Aggravated Assault charges decreased by 30.1%, and Drug charges decreased by 13.9%, while Robbery charges decreased by 1.3%. Substantiated Rape charges increased by 3.0%.

Secure Detention Overview

The Juvenile Court Judges' Commission's "Standards Governing the Use of Secure Detention Under the Juvenile Act" were developed to guide decision making regarding juvenile detention usage in Pennsylvania's juvenile justice system. Compliance with these standards is required for counties participating in the Commission's Grant-in-Aid Program, with the exception of Philadelphia.

In accordance with the Standards Governing Secure Detention, all counties report their secure detention admissions to the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission. Detention information appearing in this Disposition Report was extracted from either the Pennsylvania Juvenile Case Management System or the secure detention database at the Center for Juvenile Justice Training and Research. The secure detention database is populated with data reported directly from juvenile detention centers each month.


When interpreting the data contained in these tables, the reader should note the following:

- 1. The unit of count is the admission of a juvenile to a secure detention center;
- 2. A juvenile who is admitted to a secure detention center and subsequently transferred to another secure detention center without release is counted as two admissions.



Secure Detention Admissions, 2009-2013

Statewide, detention admissions have declined each year since 2009, with a 32.8% overall decrease and a 16.6% decrease since 2012. Allegheny County detention admissions decreased by 20.4% from 2012 to 2013, while Philadelphia County admissions declined by 23.6% during the same time period. Overall statewide admissions excluding Allegheny and Philadelphia, decreased by 9.6% from 2012. Philadelphia and Allegheny County account for 20.4% and 30.4%, respectively, of all secure detention admissions.

Length of Stay in Secure Detention, 2013

In 2013, the statewide median length of stay in secure detention was 7 days, which is an increase of one day from 2012. The table below shows the median length of stay by county, from greatest to least number of days. *Multiple counties with identical length of stay are listed alphabetically. This data, sorted by greatest to least number of admissions, can be found in the appendix.*

Codes Related to JCJC Standards Governing the Use of Secure Detention Under The Juvenile Act


Each month, all juvenile detention centers report a Statement of Facts and Reasons that must accompany every probation-authorized admission to secure detention. Below are the Section Codes related to this process.

100 Codes	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of an alleged offense or on the basis of an alleged offense and the child's current status with the court or prior record.
200 Codes	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of a child's status as an absconder or fugitive; on the basis of a child's record of failing to appear at previous juvenile proceedings; or because of extraordinary circumstances which require secure detention to prevent a child from absconding.
300 Codes	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the written request of the child or child's attorney.
400 Codes	Circumstances under which secure detention may be ordered pending disposition, subsequent to a finding that a child committed a delinquent act or is a delinquent child.
500 Codes	Circumstances under which secure detention may be ordered following disposition pending transfer to placement.
600 Codes	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of the child's status, pending or subsequent to a disposition review proceeding.
Code 701	Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of extraordinary and exceptional circumstances.



Secure Detention Admissions by Standard Section Codes

In 2013, the overwhelming majority of secure detention admissions were authorized under the 100 and 200 Codes – 28.8% and 41.7% respectively. This trend has remained constant since 2009.




Special attention is given to the utilization of Codes 206, 701, and Unreported. In instances where secure detention is authorized under Codes 206 or 701, the juvenile probation officer is required to provide a detailed written explanation of the reasons that necessitate secure detention. These codes were intended to be utilized in limited circumstances where none of the other codes are applicable.

Code 206 - The child presents extraordinary circumstances requiring secure detention to prevent him/her from absconding. (Such circumstances may include, but are not limited to: the child's age, character, mental condition, ties to the community, the nature of the child's family relationships, drug or alcohol addiction and substance abuse.)

Code 701 - Circumstances under which secure detention may be authorized on the basis of extraordinary and exceptional circumstances.


The Unreported category, as shown in this report, indicates that a code was not reported to the JCJC. Secure detention admissions that are authorized without codes are not in compliance with JCJC Standards.

The utilization of Codes 206, 701, and admissions with an Unreported code, accounted for 44.2% of all secure detention admissions in 2013. While the utilization of Code 206 decreased from 26.0% in 2012 to 25.6% in 2013, the percentage of Unreported codes decreased from 16.7% in 2012 to 13.8% in 2013.






Utilization Rates for Pennsylvania Juvenile Detention Centers, 2013





Delinquency Placements including Disposition Reviews, 2009-2013




Statewide, delinquency placements have declined each year since 2009, with an overall decrease of 27.6%. Placements in all counties other than Allegheny and Philadelphia decreased each year since 2009 representing an overall decrease of 23.5% in these jurisdictions. Delinquency placements in Allegheny County increased slightly (4.4%) from 2012 to 2013. Philadelphia placements decreased (5.2%) from 2012 to 2013.

Delinquency Placements as a Percent of Dispositions, 2009-2013

The number of placements as a percentage of total dispositions, including disposition reviews, decreased from 2012 (8.1%) to 2013 (7.9%). Allegheny County placements, as a percentage of total dispositions, increased from 5.4% in 2012 to 5.7% in 2013. In all counties other than Allegheny and Philadelphia, the percentage decreased from 9.0% in 2012 to 8.6% in 2013. Fourty-three counties showed a decrease, eighteen counties had an increase, and six counties had no change in placements as a percent of dispositions.



New Allegation Placements vs. Disposition Review Placements

The following chart depicts the relative percentage of placements that resulted from new allegations versus disposition review proceedings. A disposition review is a hearing conducted by the court regarding a previous disposition which did not result in out-of-home placement.

The percentage of both new allegations and disposition reviews of total placements is shown for each county by Class County.

Statewide, over half of delinquency placements (55.2%) were ordered as a result of a disposition review. This figure, however, is significantly impacted by Philadelphia, which accounts for 32.5% of all delinquency placements statewide, and where 66.6% of all delinquency placements were ordered as a result of a disposition review.

Across all other Class County groups, the average distribution of delinquency placements is 50.3% from new allegations and 49.7% from disposition reviews. Philadelphia, Allegheny, Class 2A and Class 7 are the Class County groups with a majority of delinquency placements originating from disposition reviews.



Total Delinquency Placements by Type, 2013 Including Disposition Reviews


Delinquency placements to private institutions continue to represent the most frequent type of delinquency placements in 2013 - 59.2% of all placements. Commitments to drug and alcohol programs and group homes, represented 19.6% of all delinquency placements, while all secure programs (private and DHS/YDC), DHS YFC, and boot camp comprised another 12.8%. While placements to private institutions increased from 58% of the total placements in 2012 to 59.2%, boot camp placements dropped from 3.5% in 2012 to 2.2% in 2013. The remaining placement types remained fairly constant.





Outcomes of Delinquency Disposition Reviews, 2013

Although the majority of delinquency placements resulted from disposition reviews (see page 21), less than 1 in 10 disposition review proceedings resulted in a delinquency placement. The vast majority of disposition reviews resulted in an order of Continued on Previous Disposition. "Withdrawn" indicates that the motion for review was withdrawn at the hearing.





Outcomes of Delinquency Placement Reviews, 2013

A placement review is a hearing conducted by the court regarding a previous disposition which resulted in out-of-home placement.

The majority of delinquency placement review proceedings resulted in an order of "Continued in Previous Placement".

In the small percentage of placement reviews in which a transfer to another placement was ordered, most transfers were to a "private institution".








Selected Dispositions by Gender, 2013

Juvenile Court dispositions in Pennsylvania continue to primarily involve males. As reflected in the charts, the proportion of delinquency dispositions related to new allegations of delinquency involving males increases as a case penetrates further through the juvenile justice system. The distribution of dispositions by gender for 2013 has remained relatively stable from 2012 figures.



Total Dispositions by Age, 2012-2013

Seventeen-year olds accounted for 7,554 (26.1%) of all juvenile delinquency dispositions in 2013, representing the most dispositions for any age group. Juveniles who were age 16 accounted for 6,142 (21.2%), while juveniles who were age 15 accounted for 4,865 (16.8%) of the dispositions. This data remains consistent with that of 2012, in which seventeen year olds accounted for 26.6%, sixteen year olds accounted for 21.1% and fifteen year olds accounted for 16.5% of juvenile delinquency dispositions. All age groups decreased in the number of dispositions from 2012 to 2013.



This table reflects the age of the juvenile at the time of disposition. Note: The data does not include disposition and placement reviews.




Total Dispositions by Selected Variables, 2013

The following charts reflect the distribution of all juvenile delinquency dispositions in 2013 by the selected variables. The Juvenile Court Judges' Commission only requires the reporting of educational status and family status variables when a hearing occurs and/or the juvenile is seen by a juvenile probation officer. Therefore, the category "Not Reported" is listed.

Note: The data on pages 27 and 28 does not include disposition and placement reviews.

Educational Status

The vast majority (84.9%) of delinquency dispositions in 2013 reflected youth who were reported as "In School" at the time of disposition. Fifty-seven percent of youth were reported as having completed grades 9, 10, 11 or 12 or as being in an "Other" educational program.







Family Status

In juvenile delinquency dispositions, youth whose biological parents were reported as Never Married represents the largest group – more than 48%. In only 16.8% of cases, the biological parents were reported as Married at the time of disposition.

Note: The data on pages 27 and 28 does not include disposition and placement reviews.



In 2013, 47.5% of youth resided only with their mother, while only 17.5% of juveniles reside with both biological parents.





Race and Ethnicity

On the following pages, data on race and ethnicity trends related to Juvenile Court dispositions are provided. A few points of clarification regarding the reading and interpreting of this data should be noted.

The Juvenile Court Judges' Commission's Center for Juvenile Justice Training and Research collects data on race and ethnicity from each of Pennsylvania's 67 counties. The collection of this data is done in concert with the protocols outlined in *Guidelines for Collecting & Recording the Race and Ethnicity of Juveniles in Conjunction with Juvenile Delinquency Disposition Reporting to the Juvenile Court Judges' Commission* (National Center for Juvenile Justice, 2006). As such, race and ethnicity are collected and recorded as two separate and distinct sets of data.

Relative Rate Index data, which is a federally defined measure of Disproportionate Minority Contact (DMC), is included in this section of this year's report. The RRI calculates, at specific decision points in juvenile court processing, a rate of occurrence for various racial/ethnic groups, and compares the rate of occurrence between racial/ethnic groups. In short, the RRI measures the rate of juvenile justice occurrences for racial/ethnic minorities as compared to White Non-Hispanic youth.

For example, if the rate of admission to secure detention is 8 per 100 White Non-Hispanic youth and 32 per 100 Black Non-Hispanic youth, the RRI (32/8) would be 4.0. In this example, an RRI of 4.0 would suggest that African-American youth were placed in secure detention at 4 times the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth. This RRI is then evaluated to determine if it is statistically significant, meaning if it deviates from what is expected by more than chance. An index value of 1.00 would indicate that the rates are the same.




For the purposes of this disposition report, and for the convenience of the reader to be able to more readily note trends related to both, race and ethnicity are presented within the same charts, graphs, and tables. References to racial or ethnic groups are defined as follows:

White Non-Hispanic	reported as non-Hispanic for ethnicity and White for race
Black Non-Hispanic	reported as non-Hispanic for ethnicity and Black for race
Hispanic	reported as Hispanic for ethnicity regardless of reported race
Other and Unknown	reported as non-Hispanic for ethnicity and one of the following races: Asian, Pacific Islander, Native Hawaiian, Native Alaskan, Native American or Multi-Racial; or race and ethnicity was reported as unknown

Total Delinquency Dispositions by Race and Ethnicity

In 2013, White Non-Hispanic youth represented the largest racial/ethnic category for all delinquency dispositions. However, in comparison to the racial/ethnic distribution of all youth in Pennsylvania, ages 10-17, the representation of Black Non-Hispanic youth is disproportionate: 14.0% of the population versus 38.4% of all dispositions. When excluding Philadelphia and Allegheny County, Black Non-Hispanic youth represent 8% of the youth population, but 26.3% of all delinquency dispositions. Please see Appendix 23 for the number of delinquency dispositions by race and ethnicity for each county.




While statewide rates of disproportionality are not evident among Hispanic youth, the sparse distribution of the Commonwealth's Hispanic population impacts the statewide aggregate figures. Counties with significant Hispanic populations should review the appendix for county specific data on total and selected dispositions by race and ethnicity.


For some delinquency dispositions that did not result in out of home placement (Informal Adjustment and Consent Decree), Black Non-Hispanic youth comprise a smaller proportion of cases, while White Non-Hispanic youth






comprise a larger proportion of cases than what is reflected in all delinquency dispositions.

The Relative Rate Index for Diverted Cases (number of dispositions not petitioned to court) and Cases Petitioned is consistent with the distribution of delinquency dispositions for Informal, Consent Decree and Probation. In 2013, Black Non-Hispanic youth were diverted at ²/₃ the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth, and petitioned for juvenile court at almost 1¹/₃ the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth. Hispanic youth were diverted and petitioned for court at similar rates as White Non-Hispanic youth.










For dispositions that resulted in an out of home placement (not including disposition and placement reviews), the proportion of both Hispanic (14.2%) and Black Non-Hispanic (48.2%) youth exceeds the representation of all delinquency dispositions.



The Relative Rate


Index for Out of Home Placement for both Hispanic and Black Non-Hispanic youth is approximately 1¹/₃ the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth.

As in 2012, the data reported on community-based dispositions, out of home placements, and secure detention by race and ethnicity indicate that, in 2013, Hispanic and Black Non-Hispanic youth were removed from their homes for services at a higher rate, and received community-based interventions at a lower rate than White Non-Hispanic youth.

In 2013, the

representation of Black Non-Hispanic youth (58.7%) for all secure placement settings was disproportionate to what is reflected among all placement dispositions (48.2%).


Other/Unknown youth were committed to secure placement facilities at more than 2½ times the rate of



White Non-Hispanic youth. Black Non-Hispanic youth were committed at almost $2\frac{1}{2}$ times the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth, while Hispanic youth were committed at almost $2\frac{1}{4}$ times the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth.



For secure detention, the statewide rate of disproportionality is more significant, with Black Non-Hispanic youth comprising 58.4% of all secure detention admissions in 2013. When excluding Philadelphia and Allegheny County, Hispanic and Black Non-Hispanic youth represent approximately 15% and 40%, respectively, of all




Secure Detention by Race and Ethnicity

secure detention admissions. In Philadelphia, 72.3% of secure detention admissions involved Black Non-Hispanic youth and 17.2% involved Hispanic youth. In Allegheny County, 80.8% of secure detention admissions involved Black Non-Hispanic youth.

The statewide RRIs for secure detention indicate that Black Non-Hispanic youth were admitted to secure detention at more than $2^{1/2}$ times the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth and Hispanic youth were admitted at almost $1\frac{3}{4}$ times the rate of White Non-Hispanic youth.

Transferred to Criminal Procedings by Race and Ethnicity

Statewide, Black Non-Hispanic youth comprised a greater proportion of cases transferred to criminal proceedings than what is reflected in all delinquency dispositions. However, both Hispanic and Black Non-Hispanic youth were transferred at fairly similar rates to White Non-Hispanic youth.





Dependency Dispositions, 2013

In 1991, the Commission began collecting information on dependency cases that are processed by juvenile probation departments. These figures do not reflect the total number of dependency cases in the Commonwealth, nor do they represent the total number of dependency cases handled by juvenile probation departments. A dependency case is defined as a new referral that is processed by the juvenile probation department and that does not have accompanying delinquency allegations.






Secure Detention Admissions % - Section 206






Secure Detention Admissions by Selected Codes and Class County, 2013















Secure Detention Admissions by Selected Codes and Class County, 2013
